

## Corrections, Additions, and Updates to the Schedule (updated 8/13/10)

### New Courses Added to the Fall Schedule Since Pre-Registration:

369-10 Computer Crime - Kerr (see Law School Bulletin for course description). This course has been moved from the spring to the fall and will meet on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 11:00 to 11:55 a.m.

597-10 Legal History Seminar (The Culture of American Law) – Powell (Wednesdays from 1:40 to 3:40 p.m.)

American law can be viewed usefully from a variety of perspectives. In law school, we usually approach the law as a set of political norms that are articulated and enforced through formal, legal, institutions, or as the activities of professionals working within those institutions. Law is also a mindset, a shared "culture": of ideas, attitudes, memories and myths, that shape the lives and work of legal professionals as well as the broader society. In this course we will read critically writings on the law that have shaped or reflect the present nature of that legal culture. Our primary concern will be to understand more fully the nature of the law as practice and vocation through the prism of these writings. Brief reflection papers and a seminar paper will be required.

638-27 Reading Group: *The Wire* (1) - R. Fairfax

Six two-hour sessions to be determined by the instructor. This six-session, "reading group" style seminar will explore various legal, social, moral, and political perspectives on the modern criminal justice system through the prism of David Simon's critically acclaimed HBO series *The Wire*. Students will view assigned episodes from the first season of the series prior to each session. Class discussion will be framed and informed by assigned readings relevant to the thematic focus of each session.

This one-credit seminar will be graded on a credit/no credit basis, and will be capped at ten students. No auditing will be permitted. Prerequisite: Law 360 or Law 362, no later than last semester (Spring 2010). There will be no final examination and no required final seminar paper, although occasional short writing assignments may be required. Students who attend every session, and are fully-engaged, consistent, and thoughtful participants will earn one ungraded credit for successful completion of the reading group.

Note on registration: Although the reading group will be capped at ten students, up to thirty students will be permitted to register via GWeb, beginning August 23rd. The first ten eligible students who register via GWeb will be offered a spot in the reading group; the remaining registered students will be placed on a wait list.

Any student who registers for the reading group via GWeb and wishes to maintain her place in the reading group or on the wait list must attend a mandatory meeting on Tuesday, August 31st, at 6pm, Room TBA. Information about reading group meeting dates, times, and locations, as well as specific course requirements and expectations will be given at this mandatory meeting.

Any students absent from this meeting will be administratively dropped from the reading group or wait list, and eligible registered students in attendance at the mandatory initial meeting will be bumped up the list accordingly. This will be the only meeting of the reading group prior to the add/drop deadline of Tuesday, September 7th, when the roster of ten reading group participants will be made final, and any remaining registered students on the waitlist will be administratively dropped from the reading group.

Topics include, but are not limited to, the rights of secured and unsecured creditors, automatic stay, treatment of executory contracts, avoidance of pre-bankruptcy transactions (e.g., fraudulent conveyances and preferences), alternatives to reorganization, and the financial restructuring of businesses in Chapter 11.
