



Kristen **Johnson**, *Professor of Law*, is a former Commissioner for the Commodities Futures

Trading Commission and expert on fintech. Spencer Overton, Patricia Roberts Harris Research Professor of Law, studies the impact of AI on multiracial democracy. Andrew Guthrie Ferguson, Professor of Law, is one of the nation's leading legal experts on predictive policing, big data policing, and emerging surveillance technologies. Alicia Solow-Niederman, Associate Professor of Law, teaches and studies at the bleeding edge of AI law.

The Bernard Center was founded with a generous bequest from Eugene L. and Barbara A. Bernard. Gene graduated from GW Law in 1951, two years before he married his wife of 67 years, Barbara. Gene went on to become one of D.C.'s most respected intellectual property lawyers, and he argued a key case on the patent misuse doctrine before the U.S. Supreme Court.
