The George Washington University Law School. Associate Professor and (Initially) Visiting Associate Professor, Fundamentals of Lawyering Program (July 2019-present).

- Teach required six-credit Fundamentals of Lawyering course (three credits each in Fall & Spring) to ~40-45 first-year students in two sections, using problem solving approaches to develop and hone professional skills, including writing, speaking, listening, research, and client counseling. In 2024-25, supervised 65 adjunct professors and law journal notes editors to oversee the Scholarly Writing program at GW Law.
- Active involvement in problem development and lesson planning, including service on writing fellow hiring committee and on faculty teams for research memorandum exercises and on incorporation of generative artificial intelligence tools into the FL curriculum.
